A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL

Dear Resident:

Your 2012 tax bill is comprised of four separate parts: Ramsey Schools, Ramsey Public Library, Ramsey Municipal Services and Bergen County government. While we the elected officials of the Borough, receive the majority of comments about taxes, it should be noted that **only the municipal services portion is administered by your Mayor and Council.**



The Mayor and Council continue to work to hold down expenses. This year there will be a modest tax increase over 2011 of less than 2%. The municipal tax rate, including the library portion, would go from .562 to .570 (1.42% change). On a home assessed at \$431,302 (the average Ramsey assessment), the 2012 annual increase would amount to \$34.68 for the municipal services portion of your tax bill. This does not include school taxes or county taxes. The Ramsey Board of Education and the Bergen County Board of Chosen Freeholders, respectively, control those budgets.

This 2012 budget reduces spending in a number of discretionary areas to help offset some of the mandated increases and contractual obligations. For example, we have consolidated management positions and eliminated other positions over the last year and a half to reduce costs while maintaining the services our residents deserve. These efforts, along with prudent fiscal management, have resulted in flat to modest inflationary cost increases.

As our costs go up, the tax base is not expanding at a similar pace. The total value of real property in Ramsey is approximately \$2.8 billion. Because Ramsey is almost fully developed, our tax base this year

expanded by less than one quarter of one percent (.24%) mostly as a result of residents replacing older homes with newer more expensive ones, or building additions to their homes. The burden, then, falls on us as your elected representatives to make difficult choices in an attempt to keep the cost of municipal government under control, while still maintaining the high level and quality of municipal services the community enjoys.

To that end, we have also set aside \$805,000 this year for capital and infrastructure projects. These projects include continuation of our road-resurfacing program, building renovations and upgrades, more curb and sidewalk improvements, equipment purchases and various drainage projects throughout the Borough. These expenditures are part of an ongoing plan, as is the entire budget, to spread the cost of maintaining or replacing capital items over time through prudent fiscal management. We are working towards making more scheduled and budgeted long-term improvements instead of waiting for infrastructure to deteriorate or equipment to fail, and then having to make costly repairs or purchase replacements on an emergency basis in an effort to continue to stabilize taxes. Additionally, in 2012 we have added approximately \$570,000 more for debt and deferred charge repayment for large capital items that have been financed over a longer life cycle. This approach, coupled with paying cash for a portion of our capital expenditures, will help us keep our debt level low and far below what the State allows for a community our size.

Through conservative long-term planning, Ramsey is in significantly better financial shape than some of our neighboring communities. Your Mayor and Council have worked diligently to produce a leaner, more efficient municipal government, which will still be able to deliver the essential municipal services, that our residents have come to expect. Much of this credit belongs to our dedicated and hard working municipal employees, who have worked with the governing body to reduce operational costs and improve efficiencies, while maintaining high standards of performance.
