

**RAMSEY BOARD OF HEALTH  
MINUTES OF A MEETING HELD SEPTEMBER 08, 2022**

**1. President's Announcement:**

Jeff Nemeth called the meeting of the Ramsey Board of Health to order at 8:02 PM. In accordance with requirement of N.J.S. 10:4-6, Mr. Nemeth made the following announcement:

Mr. Nemeth read the president's announcement. The roll was called by Danielle Monaghan. A motion was made by Joan Waring to approve the minutes from the August meeting, seconded by Jeff Nemeth, and carried by all.

5. **Codes, Ordinances & Legislation:**

Joan said there is nothing new to report from Trenton that is relevant for the Board of Health.

6. **Special Matters:**

Joan said the walking group and Healthy Bones classes have been going well. Jeff asked if the cleaning was being done after the classes. Joan said yes.

8. **Public Water Supply:**

The water operations report for August provided by Mike Skorupa was briefly summarized.

9. **Public Health:**

Jim Fedorko read his reports and explained his COVID-19 graph showing case trends. The other towns that Mid Bergen monitors they look very similar. Jim believes the disease is now endemic since there has been no significant increase or decrease in cases, although he believes we will see a spike in the fall. Overall, cases are neither going up nor down in all 15 municipalities covered by Mid-Bergen Regional Health.

The rate of Monkey Pox was going up in June and July but now the rate has been going down which is good. The number of new cases is starting to level off. There are 50 confirmed cases of Monkey Pox in Bergen County. No cases so far reported in Ramsey. The United States has over 19,000 cases Monkey Pox cases with Spain following with over 6,000 reported cases.

In New York, a Polio case has been reported. They were unvaccinated and tested positive. Polio is a vaccine preventable disease. The public health nurse from HARP monitors vaccination status at the schools. A question was brought up to Jim if they testing the wastewater to see if the Polio virus is present Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority in Waldwick is where Ramsey's sewage is processes. Since nothing has been reported to Jim, they are either not testing the waste water or the waste water is testing negative. Jim has not heard back from the contact provided. The other question raised by a resident was if they are a baby boomer and were vaccinated for polio as a child, are they still immune? The answer from the CDC right now is they do not know. The NJDOH is currently not recommending booster shots because the disease rate is not high enough to warrant a recommendation. Jeff asked if they are doing titers. Titers are a blood test to determine the level of antibodies in your system. Jim said are not being recommended currently. Tami asked Jim and Joan if there are any religious exemptions permitted in the schools. Joan said there has not been any movement on the legislation. Polio is among the mandatory vaccinations. The goal was to reduce the number of exemptions but opposing group wanted to stop the legislations. Since, the two major leaders on the topic have retired.

Jim also provided the vector report. We are peaking for the season of mosquito borne diseases. The Alpha Gel Syndrome is an interesting one. In 2021 no cases were reported and in 2022 there are 69 YTD. A positive West Nile Virus case has been reported in mid Bergen's jurisdiction. No cases in Ramsey. The Bergen County Mosquito Control Division will come and spray if you call and leave name and telephone number. If you have a positive case in your town they will also come to spray.

**10. Health Education; Communication; Outreach:**

Ramsey Day is coming up next. Joan made a comment that she has been working on Ramsey day for over a decade and would like to say that it has never been easier because of Danielle who is such a good organizer, thinks ahead, and is cooperative. She is working with Kelley from mid Bergen, in touch with HARP and we should have a very interesting table this year. It is the easiest time she has had. Joan said the town will be providing the tent. Jeff said they did last year as well. Danielle said she is bringing an easy carry easel. Jeff asked if he needs to bring anything over. Joan said we never have enough chairs. Carla will be doing the finger pricks. Ann is coming in the afternoon. Jeff and Ann said they can bring some chairs as well. All vehicles need to vacate the area by 9:30 after dropping off materials and setting up. Danielle will send over the map and breakdown of schedule to Jeff and Tami. Joan asked if Jeff recalled what the issues were with hanging the banner last year. Jeff said he will bring bungee cords, ropes, rocks for paperweights, chairs, and the literature from the health office. Kelley Grippo, the new Health Educator at Mid Bergen Regional Health Commission gave an overview of what she will be doing at Ramsey Day. Kelley will have two posters, one on tick prevention and Lyme disease and the other is on mosquito prevention and west Nile virus. Kelley will also be bringing a doll that has ticks put in for people to find. She will be covering a little bit of diabetes and literature e of everything and a diabetic plate with different mix and match foods for how people with diabetes should meal plan and how they go about it. Carla said she will talk about diet and thyroid and finger pricks. Carla will be bringing her manipulable thyroid model for display. Kelley said she will also have some free giveaways such as pens, sunglasses, and wallet sized tick removal cards for the table. Danielle said there are two boxes of books that will be set up on a portable bookshelf borrowed from the Ramsey Library. The stand will be placed by the Board of Health booth so that kids can bring home free health related coloring books and children's books. Jillian asked if they needed help from the ambulance this year. They had put out an internal email saying they will be helping. Tami said she has been in touch with Kurt and they will be doing hands only CPR demos and letting people practice and give out literature on heart issues and CPR. Jeff said the HARP table will be right next to RBOH. Tami is bringing a giant tick for display and for residents to interact with. Sharon and Michaela will be there at the HARP table. Danielle said last month she mentioned putting out free rapid COVID tests fir residents but after speaking with the nurses the tests should be kept at room temperature. This will be difficult in nice weather and if people put them in their bags and walk around all day, we cannot monitor storage temperatures. The nurses said it would be much better to giveaway at the flu clinic. Jeff asked about the free radon tests, but they need to be picked up from Paramus. The information on how to get them is posted on the Ramsey. The flu clinic is September 29<sup>th</sup> from 9:30 to 12:30 at the Ramsey Community Center. Flu shot will be free with Medicare Part B. Flu shots will be \$15 without Medicare Part B. Credit and Debit will be accepted. HARP nurses will be doing blood pressure screenings, the Ramsey Police Department will be there with the drug take back stand, and the ShopRite dietitian will be there handing out samples and recipes.

Martha read her monthly abatement reports for August. Joan asked what the issue at Favale's were and Martha explained what they received a conditional satisfactory for.

**15. Ambulance; Ramsey Municipal Alliance; other organizations:**

Tami said The Annual Parent Academy is scheduled for October 12<sup>th</sup> has been moved to December. The guest speaker will be Steven Hill along with his father. It will be about his journey with addiction, how it was parenting a child addict, and where to find resources. The lecture is called "Not My Kid: A Father/Son Program". In spring, RMA will be having a community event instead of the at the High School which is where most of RMA's events are. The Black Poster Project is planned for the spring and includes life-size photos of those who have struggled and passed away from addition. The most recent parenting series had 16 attendees. The 3-part series discussed topics such as what's normal worry vs. what is anxiety, coping with parenting in other ways than drugs and alcohol, and the social media pressure of being the perfect parent.

Jillian gave a report on behalf of the Ramsey Ambulance Corps. In July, they had 110 calls 14 mutual aid and 3 COVID positive. In August, they had 121 calls, which is 10-15% above average. 17 of those calls were mutual aid calls and 1 was COVID positive. They have had about 1-3 COVID positive calls per month since January. Joan asked what it means when it is a COVID call. Jillian said it is when the resident presents with COVID like symptoms a form is completed. If they come back positive, they count that as a COVID positive call. They could also call for an unrelated issue and be asymptomatic, yet when arriving at the hospital test positive for COVID.

Peter Kilman inquired about the newly required Lead Inspections in Rentals that went into effect in July. A few council members have asked what the plan is since a number of realtors are asking. Danielle said Martha is going to be taking the lead inspector class. Martha was in a few meetings with other departments and will be able to report on the plan. Peter asked when do we expect this plan in place? Martha said there are no classes available to take this year, but she will be taking them next year. Martha said the grace period of two years for the towns to have a plan. Martha said she told the mayor that she will take the class so Ramsey has its own lead inspector and Mid-Bergen will as well. Martha said the addresses will be filed moving forward. Jim said it does not need to be a health inspector; it could also be done by fire prevention. Jim said the tracking system is what will be the most difficult. Peter said that is fine, but Mayor Dillon said the board of health is on point. We need direction to give people information even if that is there is no plan until 2023. Martha will report back.

## Health Officer's Report September 2022

October 12, 2022

### COVID-19

The number of new weekly COVID cases in Ramsey has slightly decreased later in the summer, and Ramsey averaged 13 new COVID cases over the past nine weeks. See attached graph. This has been the trend in the other towns that the Mid Bergen Regional Health Commission monitors. The case fatality rate for COVID in Ramsey is 0.66% based on confirmed positive cases of the disease.

### Monkeypox

As of October 11<sup>th</sup>, there are 64 confirmed cases of monkeypox cases in Bergen County. The Mid Bergen Regional Health Commission vaccinated nine people who met the requirements to receive a monkeypox vaccination. No monkeypox cases were reported in Ramsey and the rate of new cases in Bergen County is decreasing. Excellent information can be found on the NJ DOH Monkeypox Homepage.

As of October 11<sup>th</sup>, the United States has 26,778 monkeypox cases, which is the most worldwide. Brazil has the second highest number with 8,270 confirmed cases.

### Polio

In late July 2022, a case of paralytic poliomyelitis was confirmed in an unvaccinated adult in Rockland County, New York. The infection was not travel related. One case of paralytic polio is considered an outbreak, and likely indicates underlying poliovirus transmission in a community.

The local health department is urging the unvaccinated or under-vaccinated to receive the inactivated polio vaccine (IPV).

### **Influenza**

### **Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)**

Recent news reports are stating that respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is "hitting toddlers hard this year" and that infections are spiking. See page seven of the Influenza Report. United States officials are working on an RSV vaccine according to Reuters News Agency.

### **Ebola**

There is an Ebola virus occurring in Uganda with 60 confirmed cases and 44 deaths. Travelers arriving from the area are screened and monitored by the health department for 21 days.

### **COVID**

The last COVID related death recorded in Ramsey was on June 4, 2022. Attached is the weekly number of new cases of COVID from November 2, 2021 to November 8, 2022.
